Puppy Brain

We have all heard of baby-brain, but puppy-brain...its a thing! Neuroscientist Shannon O'Dell explains how puppies trick our brains.

Just looking into a puppy's eyes releases Oxytocin. It's a hormone crucial for pair bonding, social affiliation, and trust. Makes sense since who do you trust more than man's best friend?

Puppies increase endorphins and dopamine, which put us in better moods.

Contagious Knowledge

Be vigilant to vaccinate.

Do you know what DAPP stands for? You know your dog gets this vaccination every year; you may even know they stand for diseases. But what symptoms are you preventing and why do our furry friends need it?

DAPP - Distemper, Adenovirus (Hepatitis), Parvo, Parainfluenza…let's break it down.

Distemper comes with a loss of appetite, eye & nose

discharge, fever, vomit and more. An ounce of prevention is worth pounds of cure. Our best friends need this vaccination because it is transferred from animals in their back yard, such as raccoons, dogs, ferrets, pandas, etc.

Adenovirus is a common respiratory virus that can cause infectious canine hepatitis. There is a laundry list of symptoms, to name a few, look for fever, loss of appetite, depression, upper respiratory infection, cough, vomit, and diarrhea. This virus spreads through saliva, urine, and feces, so it is resilient and can survive on its own for months.

Parvo is a gastrointestinal disease that causes fever, redness in mucous membranes, abdominal pain, vomiting and bloody diarrhea. Parvo can live outside a body for two years. Puppies are most susceptible; it is also transmitted from coyotes, foxes and wolves.

Parainfluenza is not just kennel cough (CIRD) even though it can lead to that; it shows up with cold-like symptoms. Dogs can contract it from a dog park, groomer, etc. where the virus is on a hard surface for less than 10 hours or directly from an infected dog.

Best advice: Be aware of your dog's surroundings and contact with other animals. Of course, always get your recommended vaccinations.

Prevent dehydration this summer by providing your dog with unrestricted access to fresh, cool water both indoors and out. Ice cubes and frozen chicken/beef broth encourage your dog to take in more fluids and help keep him cool. You can also give wet dog food during the summer to increase fluid intake.

Dang that Bang

As we celebrate the country's independence, many animals experience terrifying evenings. Many pets will go missing because of their fear of fireworks. Others shake and hide. What can you do to help soothe your fur baby and ensure safety?

- 1. Create a safe haven for your pet in a sheltered, safe place in the home.
- 2. Have access to you and plenty of fresh water.
- 3. Turn on music or television to drown out the noise.
- 4. Consider a thunder shirt. Make sure tags and microchips are updated.
- 5. Play games with your pet, keep him/her occupied inside during the fireworks.
